

Flood Update – Davidson County Carwashes Still Closed

One week after extensive flood damage, car wash operators in Nashville are still under a mandated shut down until another water treatment facility is brought online, which may not be for another week.

While the decision to take such action is understandable, the way it was communicated to the public is not. Car washes were the only business forced to shut down during this water crisis and the media painted a target on the backs of car washes as huge water users, while demonizing those customers who opted to wash their vehicles. The media coverage negatively affected wash activity in surrounding counties, even though those areas were not under a water restriction.

A few years ago when Georgia faced drought conditions, carwashes were targeted to shut down. Those car wash operators banded together forming the Georgia Car Wash Association to send out a cohesive positive message about car washes. It may be time for car wash operators in Tennessee to band together to form the Tennessee Car Wash Association so we can deliver a positive unified message to the public about the benefits of using a professional car wash, highlighting that it is environmentally friendly to use your local car wash rather than washing a vehicle in the driveway.



Yesterday, I volunteered to help flood victims in a poor and elderly section of Nashville. Working with other volunteers, we completely gutted four homes and I proudly wore a **Legends Car Wash** shirt, letting the public know that car washes are not the bad guys and are here to help. I like this picture I took because as I was talking with the home owner after we completely gutted his house; he said

that he put up the American flag because if "you have to start over with nothing, there is no better place to start than in the good ol' US of A".
